## **Workshop Summary:**

The Income Security Roadmap for Change is the first report in 30 years that recommends major investments in and improvements to programs that affect the lives of low-income people in Ontario. This session will review the Roadmap's recommendations for change to social assistance and other income security supports, including those that relate to Indigenous program design and sovereignty. We will then examine how and why the Roadmap is an essential complement to progressive visions for a basic income guarantee. And we'll consider both the political and policy-related viability of paths to reform in future.
