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Campaign introduction

Last year, over 142, 000 young people voted the need to have a Curriculum for Life as the most important issue for them. What does this mean? It means that, young people are saying that the education system needs to do a lot more to prepare them for life after school and college!

Campaign Aims

- To raise awareness of the importance of a curriculum for life for all young people
- Gain the support of decision makers on our calls for curriculum that prepares us for life



- We want PSHE to cover all we need to actively participate in life! We want to know about finances, relationships and sex, the political system, cultural awareness and community cohesion, sustainable living and citizenship!
- We want our teachers to be trained so that they are empowered to deliver quality lessons.
- We want time set aside in our timetables, we don't just want it to be a time filler or random lessons.
- We want it to be taught in all schools to all pupils! No matter where you live or the type of school a young person goes to, they should have a curriculum which prepares them for life!

WILL YOU JOIN OUR CALL?



- There are 12 statutory subjects that have statutory status this means they have to be taught and assessed in schools. Personal, social, health and economic education (PSHE) is a non-statutory subject. There has been a big campaign – supported by over 100 leading organisations including the British Youth Council, 92% of parents, by 92% of pupils, 88% of teachers and 85% of business leaders, the Children's Commissioner, the Chief Medical Officer and the national police lead for child sexual exploitation, and leading Parliamentarians from across the political spectrum, including the Commons Education Committee and the Home Affairs Committee and the chairs of Commons Health, Women and Equalities and Business, Innovation and Skills Committees.
- Due to its non-statutory status PSHE education is often squeezed from the curriculum in many schools, taught very irregularly or taught in ways outside the curriculum such as tutor time which is not recommended by experts such as the PSHE Association, the subject's national body. Teachers are not trained to teach PSHE so the standard varies nationally. OFSTED have even said that standard of PSHE is 'not yet to a good standard in schools the overall picture of PHSE. The subject is slowly but surely being pushed out of school and teachers are not being trained to deliver it.
- Through the Children and Social Work Bill, Relationship and Sex education will be compulsory from September 2019. This is just the beginning of change though! The Government plans to consult on the same status to personal, social, health and economic education

Some Useful tips for your meeting:

- Take your passion with you but also make sure you read the campaign brief on why this campaign is important. You can never be over prepared.
- Take a note pad with you so you van note down any important points but also to remind yourself of any key points.
- Make sure you introduce yourself and mention what you are there to discuss.
- Listen with intent allow your MP to respond to your points/questions.
- Take your time! Take your time to make your points and respond to any questions.
- Do not doubt yourself remember 'Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has'. There are other young people across the UK doing the same thing you are, you are not alone!
- As the meeting is coming to a close, briefly run through what you have discussed and what steps you are going to take to move forward.
- Be sure to take the time to thank your MP for agreeing to meet.

3. Meet with your Head of School/College/Sixth Form

What we need you to ask your Head of School/College/Sixth Form

- 1) To pledge to support calls in this campaign and work to implement a curriculum for life
 - If they support it, ask them for a quote
 - If they do not support it ask them for the reasons, take not of these and let us know!
 - If your school or college already deliver PSHE, then ask them to support this campaign!
