

Management Committee Report to 27 September 2017 AGM Brief Update on 2016-17 Annual Plan

Our Vision for ENM and our Region's Environmental Sector (2016-26):

If ENM does everything right as an organisation, "We will have an inspired, connected community creating a healthy living environment in the Manawatū"

By 2026:

- Everyone in the catchment will know about ENM;
- Half the population in the catchment will be involved with or connected to an ENM; member group (supporters, sponsors, donors, volunteers, active members);
- The Manawatū Region will be a showcase for what grassroots action can achieve;
- An eco-designed Environment Centre and an electronic volunteer transport vehicle will serve as a direct interface with the public, and as a base for outreach to advise individuals and businesses;
- All councils will engage ENM in pre-consultations;
- ENM's funding base will be broadly diversified, so that we are not solely reliant on our PNCC contract and Lotteries grant as our major funding sources;
- ENM will be connected beyond the region

 Serving as a point of public contact; Developing volunteer recruitment strategies; and Providing information resources to our members. 	 Formalised relationships with Massey allowed us to promote member group activities. MUSA (Massey University Students' Association) has become an ENM member group. We have run a number of outreach stalls on Massey's Turitea campus. There is an increase in volunteer interest. Subscriptions to ENM's Update newsletter have increased to 780 (note - the newsletter is forwarded to many more). Likes on Facebook have increased to 648. 	
Further support the development of the Biodiversity Cluster	Regular monthly meetings of the cluster have continued with funding support from PNCET. Cluster members developed a Manawatū River Catchment Source-to-Sea vision, mission and objectives.A working group was formed to develop an agreed action plan. Horizons provided funding for consultant Fiona Gordon to assist with drafting the documents and facilitation. Two workshops were held with the working group. Following the workshops, two high level documents and a detailed action plan were drafted and taken back to the full cluster for feedback and endorsement on 6 September. The latest versions of the two high level documents accompany this report and draft Agenda for the AGM. The draft action plan, the detailed document, will be made available in electronic form prior to the AGM.At the September cluster meeting, member groups present voted in favour to continue with the action planning and stakeholder engagement process and to ask ENM to act as the interim legal entity for the cluster.Funding applications were submitted to the Fonterra Grassroots Fund and PNCET to design and print documents 1 and 2. Many thanks to David Currin for support in securing these machines, setting them up and donating Monitors, keyboards and Mice for them. 5 licences for ARC GIS software have been donated by ESRI for the use of the biodiversity cluster for mapping. Richard Ram has volunteered a significant amount of time to researching the best software solutions for ENM's Community Relationship Management system. ENM will implement the Infoodle database and funding has been approved from the Lion Foundation for the costs of implementation and the first year of subscription. Staff have improved office efficiencies by ensuring all staff are using shared drives and by implementing and utilising Slack - a team communication tool.
