Born in Roxburgh in 1960, David grew up in Dunedin and has a BCom (Acctg) and LLB from the University of Otago. He was a litigation and managing partner in law firm Anderson Lloyd and was a cofounder of the Dunedin Community Law Centre.

David is an experienced CEO and company director in a range of industries and has experienced both success and failure. He was involved in a number of start-up

businesses in the agri-biotechnology field including A2 Corporation, and BLIS Technologies which he managed from start-up to the main board of the NZX.





He held various Ministerial portfolios in the last Labour-led Government including Attorney-General, Energy, Climate Change, Transport, Land Information and State Services. In 2008 he was named by the Listener magazine as Environmentalist of the Year for his work as Minister of Energy and Climate Change. He pioneered New Zealand's emissions trading scheme, then described by many as the most significant environmental reform in NZ for decades.

In opposition his roles included Deputy Leader of the New Zealand Labour Party and spokesperson on Finance, Trade and Export Growth.

After the 2017 election, David was named a minister in the Jacinda Ardern-led government. He was appointed Attorney-General, Minister for Economic Development, Environment, and Trade and Export Growth, and Associate Minister of Finance.

He maintains strong interests in the protection of civil liberties, as well as economic and environmental policy.

David pursues policies which both enhance economic growth and address the growing extremes between rich and poor in New Zealand, while protecting the environment.

Sir Ray's Lifepod story

Sir Ray Avery GNZM is a successful Scientist, author, entrepreneur, and philanthropist.

Ray is an internationally recognised charismatic and entertaining public speaker who challenges everyone to "Dream Big"

A former street kid Ray went on to become an internationally recognised scientist and entrepreneur.

A founding member of the Auckland University School of Medicine, Department of Clinical Pharmacology and former Technical Director of Douglas Pharmaceuticals who, over the past thirty years, has made a major contribution in the development of New Zealand's Pharmaceutical industry.

Working throughout Africa and Asia and exposed to the raw and real shortcomings in healthcare, Ray was determined to use his knowledge of Pharmaceuticals, Science, Project Management and Product Design to tackle big health issues endemic throughout the developing world at a very practical sustainable level.

In 2003, Ray founded Medicine Mondiale and using his contacts, and charisma he enlists the help of other scientists, and social entrepreneurs to work with him.



Today, an International network of scientists, technologists together with New Zealand companies and Nobel Laureates' support him and somehow everyone finds themselves donating their time and knowledge for free and they are rewarded by making a difference.

Ray has also invented the Acuset IV Flow Controller which was a finalist in the 2008, Saatchi & Saatchi World Changing Ideas Award, and Proteinforte a revolutionary treatment for Protein Energy Malnutrition and the low cost Lifepod infant incubator specifically designed for use in the developing world

His work has been recognised by his peers and he has received numerous awards including a Rotary Paul Harris Fellowship, The Bayer Research and Development Innovator Award 2008, World Class New Zealand Award for Biotechnology 2009, TBWA Disruption Award 2010, Kiwi Bank New Zealander of the year 2010. The Blake Leadership Medal 2010 The Ernst and Young Social Entrepreneur Award 2011.

Ray is also the Patron of the Non Resident Nepali Association of New Zealand a position previously held by Sir Edmund Hilary and is Chair of the New Zealand Health Innovation Hub and the New Zealand Plunket Foundation.

In January 2011 Ray was appointed a Knight Grand Companion of the New Zealand order of Merit which is the highest order of the New Zealand Knighthood honors.

In 2014 Sir Ray and his team launched a world-wide a campaign to raise \$2 million dollars for the production of the breakthrough Lifepod Incubator that will save the lives of newborn babies in developing counties at a tenth of the price of present incubators, which can cost up to \$30,000, breakdown and are unfixable in third world conditions,

'We had to do something bold to raise funds, the opportunity to make a difference and save lives of the most vulnerable is too important for us to not make the final hurdle,"
