

Speakers at a Glance:

Thomas Boehm is the founder and executive director of Faith for ALL. Thomas has a unique blend of experiences that allow him to successfully build bridges between the often disconnected worlds of religion and social services. Thomas has a masters degree in Counseling Psychology from Northwestern University and over ten years of work experience in the disability agency provider world. Additionally, he has another masters degree in Divinity from Trinity International University and over sixteen years of experience actively serving and working in the faith community world.

Rev. Dr. George Brooks, Senior Pastor of St. James Missionary Baptist Church since June 1984, received a B.A. Degree from the American Baptist College and was an outstanding honor student. He received a Doctor of Divinity Degree from the Shiloh Theological Seminary in Stafford, Virginia. Dr. Brooks has been very active in other religious and civic activities. He served two years as second vice moderator of the Little Fork District Association, seven years as president of the Congress of the Missionary Baptist State Convention of Tennessee, two years as deputy secretary of the Christian Education Board of the National Baptist Convention Of America, Incorporated and two years as the chairman of that same board.

Rev. Lillian Hallstrand, M. Div., Chaplain has worked in hospital chaplaincy at Vanderbilt University Medical Center for over three years, providing primary coverage to the Emergency Department, Trauma Unit, Labor and Delivery, and Surgical Intensive Care Unit. Lillian received her undergraduate degree from the University of Denver and Masters Degree from the University of Tennessee. She has her Master of Divinity from Vanderbilt Divinity School and is ordained in the United Church of Christ.

Dr. Keith G. Meador joined the Vanderbilt Department of Psychiatry faculty in 2010 coming from Duke University where he established and directed centers in the Medical Center and Divinity School focused on the intersections of religion and health. His scholarship builds on his clinical research, and teaching background in mental health, practical theology, and public health seeking a better understanding of the interaction of individual and socio-cultural contributors to health and human flourishing.

Chris O'Rear is the Executive Director of the Pastoral Counseling Centers of Tennessee. He is a Fellow in the American Association of Pastoral Counselors and a licensed Clinical Pastoral Therapist in Tennessee. He has worked as a hospital chaplain and has taught pastoral care classes in various settings. Chris has written for several publications in the area of Pastoral Care.

Father Charles Strobel, Founding Director of Room In The Inn (RITI), started RITI in Nashville in 1986 after seeing the need first-hand at his downtown parish. Fr. Strobel says, "Room In The Inn is a ministry that enables more people to understand the problems of the homeless by getting directly involved with people who are homeless." They look to area churches to open up their facilities to them to provide housing, food and fellowship. Most churches participate in the program by housing a set number of guests once a week during the months of November through March.

Dr. James Vandiver is part of the ministry staff of the Harpeth Hills Church of Christ where he works with Older Adult Ministries and is the Director of Harpeth Hills Resource Center on Aging. He served as President of the Tennessee Association of Homes and Services for the Aging from 2001-2004. From 1997-2000 he was Director of Community Relations for LifeTrust America, a senior services company involved in Assisted Living throughout the Southeast.
