Faculty at a Glance

Amanda Bracht, LCSW, is the Director of Emergency Psychiatric Services as the Mental Health Cooperative, where she manages crisis services, diversion services, correctional mental health services, and therapy services toward maximum efficiency and quality of services for individuals with mental illness.

George Brooks, Sr, DD, is the Pastor of St. James Missionary Baptist Church in Nashville, where he has served since 1984. Rev. Brooks was elected President of the Missionary Baptist State Convention of TN in 1995. He is an avid supporter and volunteer of the Tennessee Suicide Prevention Network.

Tim Jennings, MD, DFAPA, is Chattanooga-based psychiatrist who serves as President of the Tennessee Psychiatric Association. He is a specialist in TMS, a drug-free treatment for depression. Dr. Jennings is a lecturer, international speaker, and author of *The God Shaped Brain* and *Could It Be This Simple? A Biblical Model for Healing the Mind*.

Chris O'Rear, MDiv, MMFT, is a popular speaker, preacher, and author of several published articles and Sunday school lessons. He is a Licensed Clinical Pastoral Therapist and serves as Executive Director of Pastoral Counseling Centers of Tennessee.
