	Widely seen as a successful and radical break from the past, optimism about Greece's economic modernisat programme of the period since the mid-1990s came to an abrupt end in early 2010. Since then, the country I been forced onto a different path of reforms and fiscal consolidation measures, entailing elements both modernisation and of curtailment of some of the economic achievements of the past. The panel will consider successes and failures of Greece's economic modernisation programme over the last two decades and challenges and opportunities represented by today's conjecture during and, prospectively, after the complete of the EU/IMF Economic Adjustment Programmes in the country.

<b>14.30-16.00</b>	Session 3: Social Policy
	A large academic literature exists discussing the problems and limitations of the Greek welfare state – from its ineffective targeting and weak safety nets to problems of clientelism, corruption and capture. The recent crisis and the austerity policies implemented in Greece are generally considered to have weakened the functioning, generosity and effectiveness of the Greek welfare state even further, with social policies becoming under-funded. At the same time, the crisis has called for a rationalisation of social policy provision, while also new – and modern – forms of welfare state functions are slowly introduced in the country (e.g. the Guaranteed Minimum Income). The panel will discuss the modernist and pre-modernist elements of social policy in Greece and the evolution of the Greek welfare state over the last twenty years and prospectively into the future.
